NYC SCHOOL SURVEY – STUDENT SURVEY DEFINITIONS GUIDE

The goal of the NYC School Survey is to collect important information about each school's ability to support student success. Whenever possible, students should complete the survey independently without assistance from proctors or other school staff. When necessary, proctors are permitted to provide students with definitions to words that appear in the survey. Below is a definitions guide that offers some definitions to words commonly found on the survey. The definitions and examples are from the *Longman Dictionary of Contemporary English,* which is an advanced learner's dictionary, providing definitions using a restricted vocabulary, helping non-native English speakers understand meanings easily. It is available in four configurations:
