

## Section 504 Services vs. Preschool Special Education Services: A Fact Sheet for Families and Pre-K Programs

504 services and preschool special education services both support children with disabilities and medical needs at no cost to parents. They are similar in some ways but quite different in others.

This fact sheet compares the services side-by-side in order to help families and pre-K programs understand the differences and best support children.
